2021 Olympic Peninsula Fall Crawl

This past September, 14 trailers spent two weeks exploring the perimeter of the Olympic Peninsula, staying two or three nights at 6 campgrounds. Campers left each campground and arrived at the next one on their own, exploring the area along the way. As with every crawl, we gathered each day at 4:00 for happy hour Margaritas, appetizers, and conversation. We had three potluck dinners. We also met most nights at 8 for a check-in, our nightly raffle, and more conversation. (The only day we missed was the second Friday when we had 3 inches of rain in 24 hours and had to set up camp in pouring rain and puddles!) The rest of the time was spent exploring the areas individually or in groups, visiting at various campsites or relaxing on our own. We began along the Hood Canal at Dow Creek RV Park in Hoodspport. Dow Creek is more like a campground, and we all enjoyed it. We started the Crawl Friday night with fresh BBQed oysters, clam chowder, corn chowder and, of course, Canadian Margaritas at Bev and Ed's cabin. Campers spent the weekend exploring the Staircase area of Olympic National Park, hiking the Hoodspport Park trails and visiting the little town of Hoodspport. The next stop was Port Townsend on the Northeast side of the Peninsula, where we stayed at the County Fairgrounds. Port Townsend is a fun Victorian town with several museums, lots of shops and great restaurants. Several of us also explored the bunkers and trails of Fort Worden State Park. After driving along the top of the Peninsula through Sequim and other scenic areas, we stayed at Elwa Dam RV Park in Port Angeles. We were close to Hurricane Ridge, a beautiful part of the Olympic National Park, and several people visited it. Breweries and casinos were also visited! We drove in the rain to the town of Forks, where we were constantly reminded that the movie Twilight was filmed. We had mixed reviews of the campsite, mainly because of our time spent trying to set up in pouring rain, but we will

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agree it was an experience we'll never forget. Some of the most beautiful beaches are on this northern coast and we all visited Beach 1 and Beach 2 on the Quileute Reservation. The tribe also had an excellent restaurant in the town of La Push. All 19 of us had dinner there one night to celebrate two campers' birthdays. Our next stop was the Rain Forest Resort Village on Lake Quinault, which is also part of the Olympic National Park. On the way there, all of us stopped at the ONP Hoh Rain Forest Visitor Center. Several of us stopped at Ruby Beach, which has been said by many to be the most beautiful beach on the west coast (several in Oregon definitely compete with it). Lake Quinault RV Park was right on the Lake Quinault. We explored the area and found some good hiking trails during our time there. Our last stop was off the Olympic Peninsula at Bruceport County Park, outside of South Bend. It was a small campground that held us and many bow hunters, as apparently it was deer bow hunting season. We stayed there either one night or two, depending on our schedules and then said a heartfelt goodbye to all of our fellow travelers, another great Fall Crawl adventure under our belts. Six years ago, Brian Woods organized the first Fall Crawl in north central Washington along Highway 20. The next four years, he took us many places in Oregon, Washington, and Idaho for two weeks each September. These crawls were always full of adventures, friendships, and relaxation. And, of course, Canadian Margaritas each day at 4pm. He planned the Olympic Peninsula Fall Crawl for 2020, but due to Covid, he had to cancel it. We followed his plans and held this Fall Crawl in his honor.

So long time no chat, no camp 🙄 and all that. Some of you that know me, know that I work at O'Reilly Auto Parts. 3 months ago, I became a store manager... it's been awesome. But the real reason I came here is that I have noticed a scary trend.

Thieves have been removing and or stealing the hitch pins that hold the hitch in the receiver. This morning (8/10) I had my 3rd customer in the last 2 weeks come in and buy a LOCKING hitch pin because their standard one was stolen from their vehicle while it was connected to their trailer.

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One Pan Skillet Pork Chops with Apple Butter

Skillet Pork Chips with Apples is the perfect fall dinner recipe. This one pan apple butter pork chops recipe is filled with flavor!

I am always searching for One Pan Meals because they are so dang EASY. That's just how I roll: Easy Breezy, beautiful... Wait, that's a different motto. Mine is "Easy recipes are the best recipes!" It doesn't have the same ring to it, but it's SO true. Less time slaving away in the kitchen, less cleanup, and more time to enjoy with family. That's why I love these One Pan Skillet Port Chips with Apples! You get juicy apple butter port chops AND apple slices, all in one pan. It's a beautiful and delicious dinner that's perfect for any night of the week. Everything is cooked in the apple butter, so it's absolutely filled with flavor. You are going to love how easy the recipe is, and you'll love the easy clean-up even more!



Ingredients

- 2 pork chop filets
- Salt and pepper
- 3 tablespoons butter divided
- 15 ounces 1/2 jar apple butter, divided (more if desired)
- 2 apples cored and sliced. No need to peel them.
- 2 tablespoons packed brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon ancho chili powder or just chili powder
- 1/3 cup heavy cream

Instructions

1. Season both sides of each pork chop with salt and pepper.
2. Melt 2 tablespoons butter over medium high heat in a large skillet. Add the pork chops and cook each side for 3 minutes. Place pork on a plate and allow to rest while you cook the apples.
3. Using the same skillet, melt the remaining 1 tablespoon of butter. Add the apple slices and allow to cook until soft, about 5 minutes. Pour in 1/4 of the jar (7 1/2 ounces) of apple butter (you can use a bit more if you want, but it does get pretty sweet), brown sugar, and chili powder. Stir to combine. Add in the cream and continue to stir. Bring to a light boil.

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4. Add the pork chops, pushing aside the apples to make sure the bottoms of each pork chop are touching the skillet. Spoon a tablespoon of apple butter onto each side of each pork chop as you cook.
5. Cook each pork chop for about 4 more minutes on each side, adding a tablespoon of apple butter to each side as you cook. Cook until pork is cooked through to your liking.
6. Serve hot with the apple mixture spooned over the pork.
7. Enjoy!
8. Serve the chops with the apple mixture spooned on top

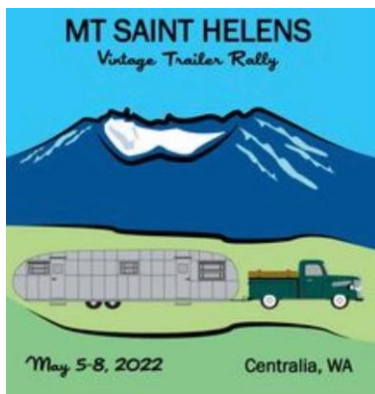

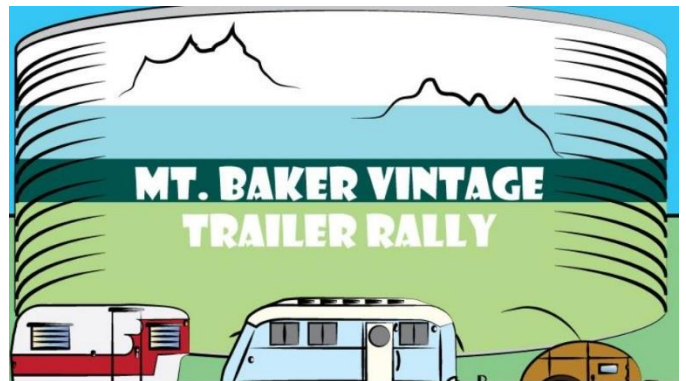

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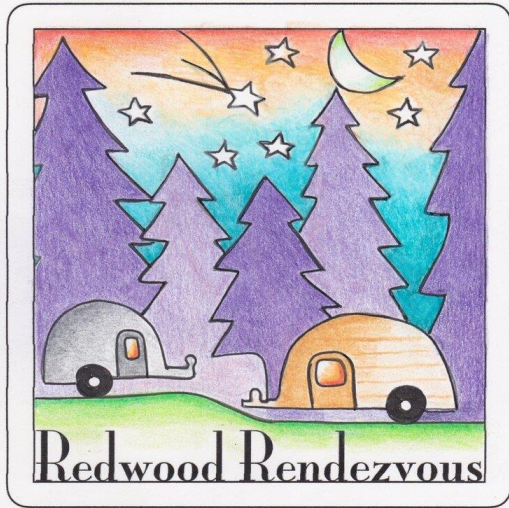
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September 15-20, Carlotta, California
