But, we had to have a name to do this. Thus, TOW was created and registered with the State of Oregon. Just this last March of 2002, TOW became a full member of the NWCCA. All member clubs share in the net proceeds of the October show and swap meet.

The intent of becoming a full member is to help fund this newsletter and a possible web site. Also, we can help with the expenses of the two original Pacific Northwest teardrop campout gatherings – the Spring Fling and the Champoeg Campout. Their current registration fees no way cover all the expenses that their hosts pay out each year to put on these functions for us.

The ovens were placed on nearby tables, opened up and with the salads at the other end of the table, we had a wonderful potluck. In addition to the dinner, we had a special violin duet by 11 year old twin sisters Angi and Lui Gue.

Saturday was taken up with the caravan to Packwood for the annual Swap Meet that literally takes over the whole town every Memorial Day weekend. Many of us really found some special treasures to add to our hobby, tool shed or tacky collection.

Due to a glitch in next year's reservations, the Memorial Day weekend Spring Fling will be held closer to Packwood at Cascade Peaks RV Resort and Campground in the town of Randle, along US Hwy 12. We will have a grassy group camp area with a large gazebo for us to use. We can share water and electricity and have our own restroom facility. The cost will be about \$13 per site per night and no cost for pets. Look for more information in early 2003. It will still be on Memorial Day Weekend.

Attending the event were seven veterans from past years. The great news was that we had six rookies, some who had never, ever attended a teardrop gathering before! Perhaps the most unusual was the six-foot wide unit that Ed Kelson brought. It was restored from one given him. Doug Cronn brought his '29 Ford panel street rod and matching restored KenSkill that won a trophy at this year's Seattle Roadster Show as the "Moonshine Express". Ron/Jeanne Mecham brought the boat-tear combo that they are reproducing as a brand new trailer for sale. Kelsey/Marilyn Farrell, from Kennewick camped in the original Nighty Mite that was used for the pattern being sold by the Ennis father/son duo. The Dick Gue family showed up with their Cozy Cruiser towed by their bright red diesel-powered modern Volkswagen Beetle. Ed Avila, from the Seattle area, and Bill/Cindy Birt brought their special teardrop treasures and rounded out the Spring Fling rookies.

### "FOURTH OF JULY TEARDROP FUN" IN CARNATION!!

We've been invited to stay at Ken and Marty Masdens over the Fourth of July holiday and take in the celebrations in their hometown of Carnation, Washington (in the Seattle area). This will be the first annual event. And, they are extending their welcome for us to camp on their five-acres just outside of the town a day or two before and after the Fourth.

In a nutshell, this is what we'll see as a small-town celebrates our Independence Day:

You can eat pancakes from 8:00 - 11:00, check out the Hot Rods & Harley's show, let the kids enjoy the carnival, watch the Kiddies Parade at 10:30, the Grand Parade at 11:00, eat some strawberry shortcake after that, hear some tunes and then go back to the Masdens.

The main meal on that day will be around 5:00 PM. Significant others, friends, kids, and pets are welcome. Ken will have some generic beer, diet coke and 7-Up, hamburgers, polish dogs and hotdogs available. Please bring anything special that you or your family may need and some dish that we all can share.

If you manage to hold out until dusk, Carnation also has fireworks to view. Please do not bring any fireworks to the Masdens, as the animals (and Marty) will go nuts.

Ken will try to have a few antique vehicle rides up and down Snoqualmie River Road including rumble seat rides for the kids (and young at heart).

Note that you will be more/less on your own for meals, etc. while camping (especially before and after the Fourth).

They will have two bathrooms with showers available (unless/until the well runs dry) - one in the "toy box" (car barn) and one in their walk-in basement. They may have to rent some honey buckets if we get a large turn out. We can get electricity to some (perhaps most) teardrops if we daisy chain our electrical cords.

The property is on a bit of a hill, so level camping spots may be a bit hard to find. Some of the events in Carnation like the Spaghetti Feed, Pancake Feed and Strawberry Shortcake will cost us a few bucks. No charge for camping at the Masdens.

On the 5<sup>th</sup>, 6<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> we will caravan to Snohomish to view antiques and old cars, picnic at Snoqualmie Falls and perhaps attend the car show in Issaquah.

#### "TRUCK SHOW DISPLAY" WILL BE A FUN TIME!!

Jim Abbott has come up with a great way to display our teardrops as well as an opportunity for us to attend the Truck Show at the Pacific NW Truck Museum. We've been invited to attend one of the greatest truck cruise-ins on the West Coast. It's held on the grounds of Antique Powerland in Brooks, Oregon (near Salem). They will be putting us in a grassy area along with all the vintage cars and trucks that always attend this show.

The show registration on Saturday, August 24<sup>th</sup> starts at 8 AM. The cost is \$5 and includes a dash plaque. A BBQ Dinner is part of the show and is part of a fund-raiser with reservations required by August 14<sup>th</sup>. The cost is \$15 and includes either BBQ beef or chicken with two side dishes, beverage and desert.

Camping is available at \$10 per site, but some of us have big backyards for those who travel a long way to attend this event and need a place to stay.

This show is held every year on the fourth Saturday of August. The LeMay gathering always takes place on the same weekend except for this year and next. It's always been a great show of trucks, a swap meet, Kenworth factory restored antiques, factory sponsored racing trucks and factory one-off customs.

For the last two years, we've had 20 plus teardrops on display. As always, the camaraderie and friendships we share with one another is present for the entire weekend. We are also welcome camp on both the Thursday before the show and the Sunday after the show. The camping is FREE because we're guests of the LeMays.
