# A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE HOMEBUILT TEARDROP TRAILER

The following is a history of homebuilt teardrop trailers that was researched by **John Blewitt** of Rhode Island. John let us abridge his work. For the complete text that includes illustrations call up John's very interesting teardrop web page <u>www.tinytears.cc</u>. Scan down the index to "Teardrop Stories" and find "Homebuilt Teardrop History". The complete article is available on the site.

The beginning of the travel trailer craze was 1936. In an article published in an issue of *Popular Science Monthly*, there are pictures of two teardrops. The caption describes the teardrop trailer as designed to accommodate two persons and has cooking facilities at the rear. But, we don't know for sure that they were homebuilt.

Another article published in 1936 specifically addresses the construction of a teardrop trailer. This may be the first article ever written on how to build one. It is called "The Ideal Outdoorsman's Trailer". It has many similar features we see in homebuilts today. In fact, you get the feeling this trailer could be made today even though the plans appeared in a magazine 70 years ago!

Awhile ago, there was a unique trailer sold on e-bay that had the shape of a teardrop except that it had only one wheel that swiveled. With the trailer clamped to the bumper, it became part of the car. This is called a "uni" trailer. No jackknifing when backing that rig! In fact, John Blewett tells us in his story that this trailer was used during the depression years by the builder to travel west in search of work. Perhaps the trailer was built according to plans found in a 1937 issue of the *Sportsmen's Manual*.

In 1939, many homebuilts were made from "Complete Plans and Instructions for Building the Jim Dandy Cabin Cruiser Model 'C'". Jim Dandy himself claimed that his teardrop could be made with an ordinary tool kit and a little skill.

Also in 1939, plans were published in *Popular Home Craft* magazine for the "Honeymoon House Trailer". This was a wedding trip trailer built by the groom

From 1940 to 1946 there is no history/articles about building teardrop trailers. It can be presumed that World War II had an impact on this period where not many people thought about building a tear.

Then in October of 1945, C.W. "Bill" Worman and Andy Anderson formed Kit Manufacturing Co. in an abandoned fruit stand on Telegraph Road in Norwalk, California to produce "Kit Kamper" Tear Drop Trailers." This was the start of commercially produced teardrop trailers. Kit Manufacturing is still in business today but it doesn't produce a teardrop trailer.

Popular Science Magazine in 1946 had a two-part article on "Building and Finishing Your Weekend Trailer. This trailer, even though a walk-in, does have a galley in the back under a separate hatch formed to match the roofline of its overall teardrop shape.

Then in 1947, the article that perhaps gets credit for starting the post WWII teardrop mania was published in *Mechanix Illustrated*. It was called the "Trailer for Two". It reflects the current thinking about what a teardrop trailer looks like. You know, a sleeping cabin in front and a galley under a hatch in the back. Of course, it had the ubiquitous teardrop shape too.

"Wander Pup" teardrop plans appeared in a *Popular Home Craft* published in 1951. It was suppose to lick the problem of excess weight and in many ways did. It was a lightweight.

Another set of plans showed up in a 1951 issue of *Mechanix Illustrated*. The trailer was named "Ll'I Guy". The author stated that he couldn't find a commercially built trailer that could be stored in his garage. It too is a lightweight at 780 pounds.

In the April 1953 issue of *Popular Mechanics* the "Wild Goose" was introduced. Wild Goose is the origins of the Kampmaster, a commercially produced teardrop trailer that opens up via the back, or what would be the kitchen hatch on the smaller teardrops. It has canvas sides that attach to a hatch that lifts up high enough to walk into..

The last article that can be found about building teardrop trailers was published twice. First in the August 1956 issue of *Mechanix Illustrated*, next in Volume 4, 1961 issue of *Mechanix Illustrated How-To-Do-It Encyclopedia*. Called "Camp Trailer" this was a traditional teardrop except it had a squared off back, very similar to the "Tiny Tears" teardrop that John tows.

Around 1996, web sites started to sprout up about building your own teardrop trailer. The information is easily obtained for free. National magazines no longer publish plans.

### DRIVING, CARS AND TEARDROPS IN ITALY

After two weeks of being treated to the most spectacular Italian ancient art and buildings you've ever seen, we rented a car. With a country villa B&B as a goal, we struck off on our own.

Our "upgrade" ended up being a small Ford Focus station wagon. It's one not available in the USA as it was diesel powered. We were thankful, as diesel was a bit less than the \$6 USA being charged for gasoline. It was also a five-speed that's typical of all European cars. Those who have never driven anything but automatics pay twice as much - about \$150/day!

If anyone would ask us about what NOT to do it would be: "Don't be far from home after dark". Picture yourself in an unfamiliar country. Poor signage is against you. Only automatic gas stations are open. Stopping to ask for directions does not work - customers pumping gas only speak Italian. Finally a young person was found who spoke some American. We did find home.

Driving in small ancient towns was a hoot. Most streets were cobblestone. One town had a narrow street leading into it with one-way traffic being controlled by a stoplight. We went up one steep street so narrow, that I thought we were going to have to fold-in both rearview side mirrors. One castle gate even had a slight turn in it that I thought was going to scrape the sides of the car. I could see that the natives drive small cars for a very good reason.

My most favorite car I stopped to photograph was the 1973 500 cc Fiat. It's really cute like our family's '59 Vespa car. I took pictures of several. One was with a good-looking Italian girl. I told her I was from the "Fiat Polizza" and needed her in the picture.

Several photos were taken of the minuscule Smart two-person sedan. I measured its wheelbase at 72 inchs!! Yet, it was observed on the freeways running faster that our tour bus.

Our innkeeper has a retired neighbor who owns several collector cars. I was treated to a private shop tour. Most were pre-WWII cars. There were lots of Fiats including two little Topolinos. One car was an early '60s Cadillac convertible. It wasn't driven much because it got only 4 kilometers per liter. He's in the process of building a vintage racecar. All he has are the headlight buckets; an original restored motor, a radiator shell and grill. Asked about street rods, I found that government regulations do not permit modified cars. However, there was a similarity with an American car-collector's shop – they smell the same. By the way, he's never seen a Vespa car.

We saw no campers or camper shells on pickups. No tent trailers or teardrop trailers either. We saw several "caravans", the walk-in Tiny Travel Trailers ala USA. Outside cities and on freeways there were a few truck mounted RVs the max being about 20 feet.

## VINTAGE TRAILER RALLY PART OF SALEM CRUISE-IN

## **GOLDENDALE'S BLUE MOON FESTIVAL FOR VINTAGE TRAILERS**

Goldendale, Washington is proud of its astronomical telescope. This year the city is using it to help celebrate the "Blue Moon" month of May. That means the month has TWO full moons in it (the next blue moon month will be in 2009). The first full moon is May 2nd and the second full moon is May 31<sup>st</sup> so the festival starts on Thursday, May 31<sup>st</sup> and lasts the entire weekend. NASA will be setting up exhibits at the Goldendale Observatory telescope site with a NASA Astronaut Stephen Robinson present to greet people. Bluegrass music will be performed at Ekone Park all day and at the Observatory from 6:00 PM until 11:00 PM.

Along with the festival the Great American Classic Truck, Antique Tractor and Vintage RV Hoedown is being held at the county fairgrounds. The Hoedown will be on Saturday, June 2<sup>nd</sup>. A sanctioned tractor pull will be on that day at the fairground as well. An open house "show n' shine" is planned at the fairgrounds for vintage RV folks. Registration begins at 8:00 PM and Trophies will be awarded at 3:00 PM.

Ekony Park is where you experience bluegrass music. Camp n' Jammers will be setting up on Wednesday and jamming throughout the afternoon and evening. Nine bluegrass groups play continuous on Thursday, Friday and Saturday from noon to 10 PM. Hundreds of "jammers" will be sitting around jamming with each other throughout the three-day festival. Shuttle busses take folks from Ekony Park to the Observatory, to downtown, to the Fairgrounds and back to Ekony Park. There will be a Bluegrass Gospel Revival on Sunday morning.

You are welcome to arrive as early as Wednesday to be a part of the Blue Moon Festival and join the Camp n' Jammers at Ekone Park. There is FREE dry camping for us teardroppers and TTT's at the fairgrounds. However, water and electrical hookups can be had for \$16 per night. There is a septic dump station too. ### FINDING A PLACE TO BED DOWN

Traveling with a teardrop camp trailer is a great way to see the country. However, sometimes the final destination is more than a day's drive away. To find a place to camp for the night can take lots of planning with maps, camp guides and personal recommendations. Perhaps the following hints can help.

First of all, you have to decide exactly what you are looking for. A lot of that depends on the way your tow rig and trailer are outfitted. For those of us with street rods, we find that our drive does not carry much so we have to pack the trailer too. This means that you can't sleep in the TD without having to unpack it. We usually have to find a campground or RV park. On the other hand, maybe that's why we're seeing more and more teardrops with roof racks.

Commercial RV parks are nice and have all the amenities close by. But, on the other hand, most are located close to major highways, are really lit up at night and noisy. So, we see the good and bad for camping in an RV park.

However, for those of us towing our tear with a van or truck, we can go to sleep day or night in the teardrop because it's usually empty.

So, what are some of the things to look for when driving on a two or more day trip? It's great (and cheap) to boon-dog it where you just pull off the road and park, leave the trailer hitched-up, crawl into the TD and go to sleep. If you feel safe doing this, one suggestion is drive off a main highway on a side road. If you are in open range country (as in most of the Western states), find a cattle guard through a fence-line, drive a ways and stay the night. Usually, open federally controlled rangeland belongs to the BLM and as US citizens, we own it. Maybe a howling coyote will wake you, but other than that, you have to feel safe to do this. Remember, this is only a hint. And remember also to leave only tire tracks behind when you leave.

Another suggestion for a free place to stay in the country is to scout out a local Grange Hall. These are found by asking the locals. Usually no one will hassle you and you might not chose to stay if it is also well lit and is too noisy. Most are not.

Often times the locals at gas stations and restaurants can recommend the county fairgrounds. More and more of them have RV lots because fairs and rodeos are usually a weeklong event. Some are very nice with power, water and even a heated bathhouse. The one in Goldendale, Washington is exceptionally nice at a very reasonable cost.

For those driving from the Pacific Northwest to Minden, Nebraska for ITG2, the campground at Crystal Hot Springs (off I-15 exit 372 in Northern Utah) is great. The nearby town is Honeyville! Shade by large trees at each site. The non-hookup sites are \$13 per night. Hot spring pools, café, bathhouse and showers are included. This place is off the freeway about two miles. For macho drivers and you are on a two-day trip to Minden, you are 700 miles from Portland with only 800 miles left!!
