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#### ANOTHER GATHERING IN OREGON FOR NEXT YEAR

The Northwest Vintage Car and Motorcycle Museum, one of fifteen museums at Antique Powerland in Brooks, Oregon has invited teardroppers to display their trailers during the annual Steamup. It will be Saturday, August 2<sup>nd</sup>. The requirement is to show up before 9:00 AM and stay until after 3:00 PM. In return, the displayed trailer gets two free passes. Details on camping are being made for Friday night to accommodate those traveling a far distance. The display area will be on the museum's very lush 1.5 acres of lawn.

Antique Powerland's annual Steamup is one of the greatest shows in the Willamette Valley - especially for families. All museums are open with vintage equipment operating at full tilt. One popular event is seeing a vintage, steam-driven sawmill cutting logs into useful lumber. Many steam tractors litter the grounds as do a vast assortment of those small putt-putt motors used years ago on remote country farms to operate water pumps, washing machines and other farm equipment. A blacksmith shop hammers out stuff for spectators to see.

A great attraction is the vintage trolley offering rides around the grounds. A miniature railroad for both kids and adults operates all day. Many food vendors feed you.

Antique Powerland is a few miles south of Salem at the Brooks exit number 263 off the I-5 freeway. Turn west and drive one-quarter mile to the entrance of the parking lot. The Steamup is always the last weekend of July and the first weekend of August.

# WARNING - STRONG WINDS CAN DAMAGE YOUR HATCH COVER

We're reminded that sometimes a gust of wind can do bad things to your teardrop if its hatch props are not secured. This is especially true for galley hatch covers that are lightweight. Stories are told of sitting in a campground on the Oregon Coast with the teardrop trailer all set up. A sudden burst of wind came up and flipped the hatch over onto the top of the trailer. Most hatch covers hinges are not designed to be overstressed in this way and can be damaged. Thus, it's best to have a way of securing both ends of your hatch prop. Usually, a pin will do the job. Or use a safety rope secured at both ends.

This reminder comes about from a story sent to us by Larry and Irma Reed. While in Central Washington recently on a very windy day, Irma lifted the hatch. The wind was so strong it ripped it right out of her hands, tore the cover completely off the trailer, flew forward, broke through the rear window of the pickup and just missed Larry's head.

# FIVE-WIDE PLYWOOD IS LOCATED IN OLYMPIA

# LEMAY MUSEUM UPDATE

Teardroppers have a special interest in the LeMay car collection. We've taken part in their annual Car Show since 1998 and recently celebrated the 10<sup>th</sup> display of our trailers.

Gleaned from the 2007 Car Show Volunteer Handbook written by the LeMay museum staff:

- 1. The cost to build the entire museum campus including the Pavilion, Collector Car Center, Administration and Education Center, Show Field and Retail Concourse is projected to be 90 million dollars.
- 2. The new LeMay Museum will ultimately house approximately 1,000 vehicles.
- 3. They're on track for a ground breaking in late 2007; the new museum will open in 2009
- 4. The five-acre show field will be a multipurpose, outdoor venue for car shows, auctions and swap meets, car club events, concerts and a concourse d'Elegance.
- 5. They anticipate that more than 400,000 guests will visit the new museum each year.
- 6. There are over 1,500 charter members of America's Car Museum.
- 7. The current LeMay Museum at Marymount is open for tours Tuesday through Saturday from 10 to 5, with the last tour starting at 3 PM.
- 8. The fabulous Fifties Sock Hop is November 17<sup>th</sup>, held in the gymnasium at Marymount. We sold out last year so get your tickets early.

The catch is the wording "Permanent sleeping and cooking facilities." For those of us using a camp stove sitting in a drawer or used on a counter top, it seems that we would NOT have a "permanent cooking facility".

However, a license could be a good idea if you want a "vanity" plate that goes along with your trailer's theme (hence BIGBEAR). Or, you want NO dealings with a trooper stopping you. Or, in case of theft, the trailer might be more recoverable. Then you have to pay.
