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NEXT UP - TEARDROPS AT ANTIQUE POWERLAND

We're going to have a campout at Antique Powerland the first weekend of August. Move in on Friday (for \$5) and stay Saturday for the famous Steamup. That's August 1st and 2nd.

Located at I-5 exit #163 just north of Salem, Oregon, you drive west about a quarter mile to the entrance. It can't be missed. The property is 62 acres, so drive in on the l-o-n-g driveway directly towards a Texaco sign seen in the distance. Turn right at the station to the camp. We will be easy to see from there.

Entrance to the grounds is free, as arrangements have been made at the main gate. In fact, if you show up before 9:00 AM on Saturday to enjoy the Steamup festivities, you get two passes onto the grounds. All 14 museums on the grounds will be in full operation all weekend. We will be part of the event, as we will be displaying our treasured teardrop trailers as part of a car show. You can call up Antique Powerland, Brooks, Oregon on the Internet to view all the activities going on.

This is a dry camp with no hookups. A three-minute walk brings you to a fully operational public restroom (with showers) or close by there is a Porta-Potty. We camp on a very lush lawn that's part of the Northwest Vintage Car and Motorcycle Museum.

FUN ADVENTURE AWAITS YOU AT "NW TREK WILDLIFE PARK"

For those attending Spring Fling, I'd like to recommend a delightful day's excursion to **NW TREK** near Eatonville, Washington. After a 40-minute scenic drive from Morton, you arrive at this 723 acre forested park

The land is just beautiful - with lakes, mature deciduous and evergreen trees and vistas of snow-capped mountains. Here walking trails and excursion trams, with huge sliding windows, help you view NW native animals in their natural habitat. The tram sightings are like riding on a hiking trail. The narrow one-way road means you don't see the road or any traffic- only green and animals - many times right next to the tram or 10 feet away. I have never been so close to elk herds, caribou, bighorn sheep, and buffalo and deer (also moose) in a free-roam area.

The forested walking trails also gave you views into natural, treed habitats (no enclosure in sight) to view wolves, bobcats, eagles, raccoons, red foxes and coyotes. You can also see many varieties of birds (swans, geese, osprey, owls and ducks) while riding on the tram..

Marty and I love nature and greatly enjoyed our visit there. They also have the Fir Bough café and a gift shop selling nature and animal items. A very FUN day, seeing well over a hundred animals!!! We were blessed with free admission from tickets won at the Spring Fling and thank our benefactors **Steve and Nancy Bagley** who volunteer at the Trek. It's located on two sites in Tacoma with shuttle buses (often a London Double-Decker) taking us from one place to the other. We teardroppers can view the collection "up close and personal" at our annual campout the weekend of the LeMay Open House. This year it will be Friday night August 29th to camp overnight. Most stay Saturday night too.

Our hosts for the event, **Pat and Jan Estes**, ask us to register with them (see the attachment or the TOW website (<u>www.teardroptrailers.org</u> for \$10). We're reminded to mail in the registration by August 11th to Pat Estes, 13504 14th Ave. 5, Tacoma, WA 98444. To help

out with hosting the Open House, we have to also register with the LeMay website http://www.lemaymuseum.org/carshow_volunteer.php). This is for a chance for volunteer duty when LeMay plays host to thousands of visitors. Teardroppers take pride in manning all the volunteer posts in the "Big Green" building on the Marymount Campus.

The rewards are many. When we check in at the volunteer table, we get a collectable tee shirt and either your choice of baseball cap or flat hat. We also have lunch and dinner provided on Saturday. The tee shirt is the ticket for these meals as well as the bus rides. Public visitors pay to view the collection, but teardroppers don't. Our teardrop hosts provide a Continental Breakfast on Saturday morning. That morning, we get up early to get ready. You'll be provided with a complete information packet when you arrive.

Our campsite and display of teardrops is located on LeMay's Marymount Campus in the Spanaway area in south Tacoma. Exit I-5 at #127 driving east towards Mt. Rainer. After driving about three miles, get off at Pacific Ave. Go south about three more miles to a major intersection with 152nd Street on the left and Military Road on the right. Turn left and go east a few blocks to the main Marymount entrance (look for a sign and address of 325). Turn left again onto the main grounds and proceed left to our camping area.

TOW NAMETAGS, PATCHES AND JACKETS ARE AVAILABLE

At this year's Midwinter Luncheon the new TOW patch went on sale. It was designed by Herb and Elaine Kipp and featuring the cartoon-like TOW logo.
