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NEXT UP - TEARDROP DISPLAY AT ANTIQUE POWERLAND

We're going to have a campout at Antique Powerland the first weekend of August. Move in on Friday, July 31st and stay Saturday for the famous Steamup. Saturday night campers are welcome too. For those who just want to display their teardrops on Saturday, you must arrive by 9:30 AM and stay the day leaving after 3:00 PM. We will enjoy a special band performance at the nearby gazebo late Saturday afternoon. Also, we will provide grilled hotdogs and/or hamburgers for all teardroppers. Reply via e-mail so we can buy your choice, beverage, chips, corn and potato salad. We'll eat at 6:00 PM.

Antique Powerland's annual Steamup is attended by thousands of spectators that wander the grounds enjoying demonstrations and displays of 14 separate museums. One feature is the steam-driven vintage sawmill. Another is the outstanding Pacific Northwest Truck Museum occupying two buildings. Many, many antique tractors of all types operate all day long. Caterpillar has a museum building. John Deere tractors are everywhere. A vintage trolley runs on tracks around the grounds. Great place for kids as there is an operational railroad they can ride on. Food booths are everywhere. A flea market too.

Located at I-5 exit #163 just south of Salem, Oregon, you drive west about a quarter mile to the entrance. It can't be missed. The property is many acres, so drive in on the l-o-n-g driveway directly towards a Texaco sign seen in the distance. Turn right at the station to the camp. We will be easy to see from there. We're behind the BIG building.

Entrance to the grounds is free as arrangements have been made at the main gate. In fact, you get two passes onto the grounds. We will be part of the Steamup as we will be displaying our treasured teardrop trailers as part of a car show. You can call up Antique Powerland, Brooks, Oregon on the Internet to view all the activities going on.

This is a dry camp with no hookups. A three minute walk brings you to a fully operational public restroom (with showers) or close by there is a Porta-Potty. We camp on a very lush lawn that's part of the Northwest Vintage Car and Motorcycle Museum.

Pay \$15 per trailer for food and camping. No charge if you just display your trailer and don't eat and \$5 if you do. For more information, call or e-mail Marty or Katie Boehme at 503-632-6563 or teardrops@bctonline.com.

HITTING THE ROAD ON PART OF ROUTE 66

Sue and I drove on Route 66 from Seligman, Arizona to Needles, California. It was a great drive through history. The Sno-Cap Drive-in at Seligman is a must stop for ice cream and some subtle humor that is included in the price. We went west through Peach Springs, Hackberry and some other small burgs that have slowly been fading away. Almost could see where they made the movie "CARS". It would have been great to have the '51 Chev on this leg of the trip. On some parts of the road, you could see earlier sections of Route 66 before the realignment of the portion we were on.

The Route 66 museum we stopped at was in Kingman, Arizona. It has quite a bit of the road's memorabilia and information. Pretty good gift shop too. It is housed in an old powerhouse that provided electricity for the area in the early days. The museum depicts the historical evolution of travel along the road. There are murals, photos and life-size dioramas that capture each of the groups that have traveled the route that has come to be known as the "Mother Road".

One reason we stopped was to ask about the original alignment of Route 66 from Kingman to Oatman to Needles. The lady told me that the road was paved and had a few turns. Soooo, off we went. We went thru Cool Springs (Google Cool Springs to see it) which was a wide spot for gas, ice cream and cool drinks in the old days. Then the curves really started. It was nine miles uphill on twisting turning road, then about nine miles going down hill. A narrow road with sharp turns that even with towing a small teardrop; we used both lanes on some turns.

While we drove on it in a modern car with air conditioning, automatic transmission and disc brakes, it was quite an experience. I could not fathom what it would be like in a Model T or A, loaded with all your worldly possessions, on a hot summer day and moving from the dust bowl to the land of milk and honey (a cheap plug for The Grapes of Wrath).

Oatman, Arizona is about half way on this portion of road and is an interesting place as it looked like a ghost town that has been rejuvenated into a quirky place for visiting tourists. There was gold mining in the early days with prospectors using donkeys to carry their goods. When the mines folded, the donkeys were left and the descendants of the original donkeys still roam freely around the town.

In 2007 we were in St Louis and walked across the Chain of the Rocks Bridge and drove on a few miles of Route 66 in that part of the country. It was interesting to see this other part of the road. Both areas were fascinating to see and reflect on why people traveled Route 66. Were they going on a trip, to a new life, just some salesman trying to make a living or what?

NEW LOCATION FOR ANNUAL MT. BAKER VINTAGE TRAILER RALLY

Come join us for our ninth rally being held this year at the Northwest Washington Fairgrounds in Lynden, Washington from September the 10th to 13th. You can arrive as early as Tuesday the 8th. Our vintage trailer rally is open to all trailers, all teardrops (manufactured or homebuilt) plus motor homes 25 years old & older.

Everything is either grass or paved so there's NO MORE DUST to contend with. We have a very nice meeting room and plenty of power/water sites with a dump station on the grounds. This new rally location has good showers and clean restrooms.

The quaint town of Lynden has a Dutch theme with many little shops to explore. There are numerous restaurants, some within walking distance of the rally.

For the last few years we've had over 120 units in attendance. Over time we've been getting some very excellent older units from the 1930's, 1940's and 1950's. Many are very nicely restored both inside and out with period furnishings. *We also welcome those vintage*

trailers that are "Works in Progress" as "Come As You Are". Many tow vehicles are older restored rigs as well.

Friday night will be a potluck dinner and Saturday night will be a dessert social where everyone brings a dessert to share. Following the dessert social we will be entertained by the "Valley Voices", a local women's Barbershop Chorus.

Saturday at 1:00 PM there will be a swap meet/flea market in the meeting hall. Bring any trailer, household, craft or other items to sell that might need a new home.

The rally fee is \$25.00 per unit. Camping will be \$17.00 per night including water/power hookups. There are few trees so bring your own shade. Those with air conditioning should be able to run them as needed as there are 30/50 amp-power sites. Bring your own outdoor table & chairs. Pets are welcome but need to be kept on a leash, picked up after and not brought into our meeting building during rally functions.

Directions: From the south take I-5 to exit 256 in Bellingham then head north on Guide Meridian about eight (8) miles until you get to Lynden. Turn right onto Front Street and within a mile you'll see the fairgrounds on your right.

From the north it's easiest to take the Lynden border crossing. Drive south on Guide Meridian until you get to Front Street in Lynden and take a left.

THE LeMAY OPEN HOUSE DISPLAYS OUR TREASURED TEARDROPS

For us teardroppers, it will start on Friday August 28th to camp overnight. Camping is limited to teardrop trailers only because of limited space. When you attend, there is a chance for you to pull volunteer duty when LeMay plays host to thousands of visitors at their annual Open House on Saturday.

The LeMay collection of automobile and transportation related memorabilia has no equal in the world. It's located on two sites in Tacoma with shuttle buses taking you from one place to the other. We teardroppers can view the collection "up close and personal" because we're camping at one of the sites.

Teardroppers take pride in manning all the volunteer posts assigned us by the LeMay organization. The rewards are many. We get a collectable tee shirt and either your choice of baseball cap or flat hat. We also have lunch and dinner provided on Saturday. The tee shirt is the ticket for these meals as well as the bus rides. Public visitors pay to view the collection, but teardroppers don't if they volunteer. Our teardrop hosts provide a Continental Breakfast on Saturday morning. That morning, we get up early to get ready. You'll be provided with a complete information packet when you arrive. You will get a special teardrop collector Dash Plaque for this, our 12th year.

Our campsite and display of teardrops is located on LeMay's Marymount Campus in the Spanaway area in south Tacoma. Take I-5 exit #127 driving east towards Mt. Rainer. After driving about three miles, get off at Pacific Ave. Go south about three more miles to a major intersection with 152nd Street on the left and Military Road on the right. Turn left and go east a few blocks to the main Marymount entrance (look for a sign and address of 325). Turn left again onto the main grounds and proceed left to our camping area..

The hosts for the event, **Pat and Jan Estes**, ask us to register with them (see the form on the TOW website (www.teardroptrailers.org) for \$10. We're reminded to mail in the registration by August 7th to Pat Estes, 13504 14th Ave. S, Tacoma, WA 98444. To help out with hosting the Open House, we have to also register with the LeMay website (http://www.lemaymuseum.org/carshow_volunteer.php). On this on-line registration form you should indicate "TEARDROP GROUP" in the space asking for "Club Affiliation".

INLAND NORTHWEST TEARDROP AND VINTAGE TRAILER RALLY

This is a new vintage and teardrop trailer event being held from Friday, August 28th until the following Sunday. The location is the Pend Oreille County Park in the far northeast corner of Washington north of Spokane.

Here is an opportunity for good old-fashioned camping. This is a campground that has not changed in 40 - 50 years so it will be like the old days of camping. There are no water or electric hookups. But there are several water faucets plus hot and cold showers. If you have a

generator you might want to bring it. The park is in a cedar grove on the side of a hill so we have to limit the size of the trailers to 24 feet. Most of the sites will have fire pits with free wood. Because of the slopes on some of the sites bring wood blocks to level your trailer. No one will be out in the sun as there are lots of big trees.

There are 400 acres to run around in and lots of trails. There will be a limit of 20 trailers and the smaller they are the better.

The camping fee is \$10 a night and must be paid with cash or check when you arrive. Because of the limited space a prompt reply is needed. Since there will be a limit of 20 trailers we will need whoever is interested to call or e-mail for reservations. If the limit of 20 is reached a waiting list will be made and if someone drops out the first person on the waiting list will be called and so forth. If we can get 20 trailers to commit we should have the camp grounds to ourselves. There will be a potluck on Saturday night for anyone that is interested. Bring chairs and a portable table if you have one.

Directions: From I-90 East or West take the Division Street (US Hwy 2 East and US Hwy 395 North) exit in Spokane. Head North on Division St for about five (5) miles where the road splits. Stay to the right and head for Newport (Hwy 2 East). You're out of Spokane now. Continue on Hwy 2 and drive another 24.5 miles. You are there when you will see a sign for Pend Oreille County Park. Turn left off Hwy 2 into park.
