Æbleskiver (Danish meaning apple slices (singular: æbleskive)) are traditional Danish pancakes in a distinctive shape of a sphere. Somewhat similar in texture to American pancakes crossed with a popover, æbleskiver are solid like a pancake but light and fluffy like a popover. The English language spelling is usually **aebleskiver** or **ebleskiver**.



In the United States, a version of æbleskiver is sold with a commercially repackaged pan, branded as "Pancake Puffs"

DIRECTIONS

To get there, exit # 233 off I-5 heading to US Hwy 20 West. Drive about 0.5 miles until you come to Waverly Drive. At that point, turn Left and go 1.2 miles until you come to Grand Prairie Rd. Turn Right. Go another 0.4 mile and turn Left onto Chicago. This street dead-ends into a cul-de-sac, so go to the end and look Right. You will see a barn in

FROM THE NORTH – Exit I-5 at #162 (Corson Ave) – Drive 0.8 miles until you come to Michigan St. – Turn Right onto Michigan and drive about one (1) mile until you get to WA-509 – Drive South on 509 a little bit and do a whoop-de-do up to the Right and back over the road to get onto WA-99S – Continue South another 0.3 miles until the traffic signal light at Holden – Turn Left and immediately turn left again on 2nd Ave – Go to the next street and turn Right onto Austin St – You will see the shop/museum on the right.

FROM THE SOUTH – Exit I-5 at #156 (Tukwila/W Marginal Way) – The highway turns into WA-99N – Drive a total of 5.2 miles until you come to a traffic signal light at Holden – Turn Right and immediately Left onto 2nd Ave and go to the next street and turn Right onto Austin St – You will see the shop/museum on the right.

Taco Soup (by Katie Boehme)

- 1 medium onion – Dice and brown in pan.
- 1 pound lean ground hamburger – Add to onion, brown and crumble.
- 1 envelope of mild taco seasoning (or spicy if you prefer) – Add seasoning to meat mixture.

Place this mixture into a crockpot or large soup pot. Next, add one complete can of the following (15 ounce cans, with the liquid):

- Diced tomatoes
- Tomato sauce
- Whole-kernel corn
- Kidney beans
- Black beans

Simmer all this in pot until hot (or simmer on low in crock-pot). Flavor improves if you simmer this for a few hours. Before serving, get the following:

- One bag of Corn or Tortilla Chip
- One sack of Shredded Cheddar Cheese
- One tub of Sour Cream

To serve:

- Serve the soup hot from the crock-pot into an individual bowl.
- Take a handful of corn chips and crush some to put on top of the soup or put some in the bowl first, add soup – then add more on top.
- Spoon on shredded cheddar cheese.
- Add a dollop of sour cream and ENJOY!

SPECIAL THINGS HAPPENED AT FALL BRIGADE 2011

Rod Glassett bounded into the lodge as he came back from a tour of the Aurora Colony Museum all excited about what he thought was going to be a ho-hum tour of a pioneer-era collection of old stuff. The tour was escorted by the most informed and knowledgeable person steeped in colony history that was out-of-this-world fascinating. Rod described in detail the excitement of being allowed to operate some of the pioneer machinery usually off-limits to the general public. This teardropper-only tour was told about some pioneers being buried (maybe) alive with an arm sticking out of the ground with a string tied to a bell. If the body came alive, it could ring the bell.



Another highlight after our potluck supper was a presentation by Roger Wendlick, who portrayed a hunter from the Lewis and Clark Expedition. Complete with all the trappings of an expedition hunter, he demonstrated items taken on the trip, showed us sign language used with natives and related the trip by tracing the route the Corps of Discovery took during their travels from 1803 to 1805. He even mentioned what most Oregonians and Washingtonians know; it usually rains in the lower Columbia River region. The Corps experienced only 12 days without rain during their 1804-1805 winter-over near current-day Astoria, Oregon.

We had 33 teardrop and TTT (vintage Tiny Travel Trailers) campers. Several visitors also showed up to view the trailers. The long-haul award went to Sally Eastham from Monterey, California who traveled with another Californian from Chico.

Almost all the meals were provided starting with the famous TOW Taco Soup (Friday supper), a Saturday pancake, eggs, and sausage breakfast, a wonderful potluck supper and ended with the favorite Omelets-in-a-Bag Sunday morning.

In making the Taco Soup (see page 2), we had to borrow a five-gallon pot from another soup-maker. It was suggested we needed a long-handled stirring spoon if we could find one. Danny Fantoni was asked if could “cobble” something together. Cobble indeed! It was a wooden marvel crafted by both Danny and Jane. We now have a paddle that’s adorned with our TOW cartoon logo and endorsed on the other side as the “Official TOW Pot Stirrer.”

The weather last year was very WET. On Thursday this year, it was 83 degrees at the campground. Friday was GREAT and warm enough for eating outside on the lodge porch. Saturday was warm, but it started to sprinkle in the afternoon. Sunday, packing-up was slightly wet, but not impossible. All 65 campers enjoyed our 2011 Fall Brigade weather.

The hosts, Marty and Katie Boehme, thank everyone who volunteered to help. Our campers helped with preparing the meals. They chopped ingredients, manned breakfast griddles, served, helped clean up, and made the Fall Brigade a great success.

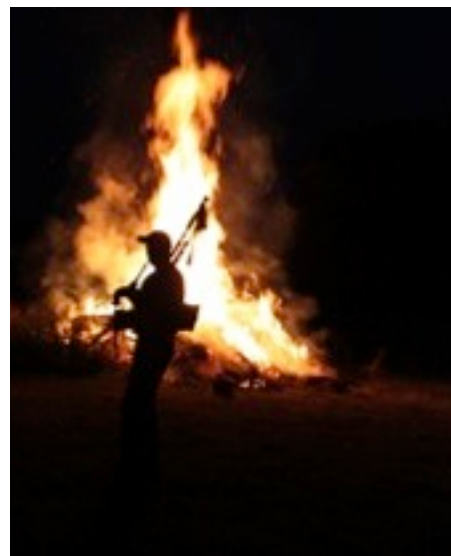

LeMAY OPEN HOUSE NOW LeMAY CAR SHOW

This annual campout of teardrop trailers was started in 1998. It was the first gathering in the Pacific Northwest with campers from Oregon, Washington, and British Columbia. Only a few teardrops showed up on the Marymount Campus on that last Saturday in August 1998.

It all started via the 1998 Shasta Lake campout in early May. Sleeping was in a very narrow teardrop designed for a single. What a great time was had visiting with other people and walking around the campsite looking at the various teardrop trailer designs, most of which were homebuilt.

The LeMay organization was approached about a teardrop group attending the Open House. During a Marymount visit, Harold LeMay himself was found driving one of his collector pickup trucks. When told that teardroppers would like to visit the Open House by caravanning from a local campground, he looked around and said, "Why don't you camp here?" What an opportunity! For the next couple of years, teardroppers would appear a couple of days early, help move cars, clean buildings with the rookie campers washing the double-decker buses as a "rite-of-passage" for their first campout.

Over the years, there have been various hosts organizing the event. The hosts now are Pat and Jan Estes. Their guidance during the recent years has made the presence of teardrop trailers one of the special features of this annual LeMay event.

The LeMay family has established a foundation that is separate from the LeMay Museum currently under construction next to the Tacoma Dome. The intent is to display the family's cars, trucks and memorabilia on a regular basis. So, now the annual event is officially known as the LeMay Car Show. New features are added every year. The entire facility is being updated too. It is a car show not to be missed.

Two Teardroppers in Glacier National Park

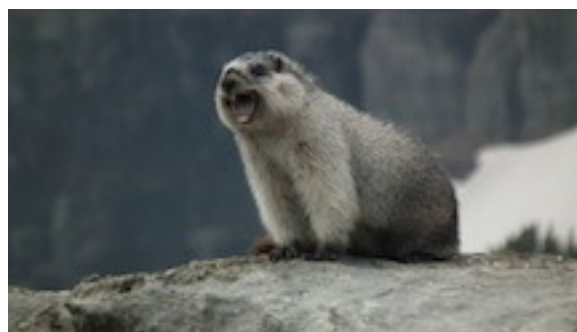

Jim Abbott's New Spin on a Teardrop

Jim Abbott is the patriarch of the Abbott clan in Silverton, Oregon. He and his family have been teardroppers ever since their kids were little. Recently, we had a view of the family's latest rendition of a teardrop. Here are some comments about it.

TL: Could you describe your Cab-Over-Engine (COE) Tear for us?

JA: The teardrop was built on the back of a 1947 COE Dodge flatbed truck with late model Dodge running gear. It has a fuel-injected 360 Dodge V-8 engine with overdrive transmission. Plus, it has ¾-ton Dodge van axles with disc brakes up front.

TL: What are some of the features?

JA: The sleeping cabin has a full sized bed that doubles as an indoor dinette. We put in a 40-gallon fresh water tank. It has a 12-volt fridge. There is lots of space and includes a wardrobe closet. At the rear, we built in a very large galley that's ended up being a great outdoor kitchen!! Another feature is the detachable propane swing-out BBQ.

TL: How many hours do you think you've spent making it?

JA: The family spent approximately three hours a night for the last two years.

TL: Did the whole family work on it?

JA: Derin, Devon, and I did the work, depending on who was available!!

TL: It's a showstopper. Now, what will the final graphics look like?

JA: I'm a six-year Vietnam Vet. I'm leaning toward the draped flag look (stars and stripes). The kids would like to see it flat black and flamed, so who knows who will prevail!!

TL: What ever prompted you to make the COE Tear?

JA: I've been towing my 1947 teardrop since 1981. We traded some mechanical work with a friend for it. It's been snow camping in the Sierras. Spring vacations spent on the California and Oregon Coasts. We've done many teardrop gatherings - Shasta, Spring Fling and LeMay are the main ones. We've made MANY memories with our four sons with it!! Two of them have their own Teardrops. I decided to build the COE tear because we needed more room and creature comforts. It's an age-thing and besides - I don't like towing trailers anymore!!

TL: Have you a ever attended the grand-daddy of all teardrop gathering on Lake Shasta?

JA: Yes. Two times. It rained sooooooo badly the last time that we chose not to do it again.

TL: What are the highlights of a gathering for you?

JA: The people and the uniqueness and creativity of the gathering. Each gathering is different. We've made new friends at each gathering!

TL: Have you had some disaster campouts with your teardrop trailer?

JA: Other than stuck in the snow a few times and the rain at Shasta we've fared pretty well.

TL: What do you anticipate for the future?

JA: A third generation of Abbott's towing teardrops.
