#### THE NAME "DUTCH" OVEN

I picked up an interesting book the other day entitled "Cast Iron Cooking – From Johnnycakes to Blackened Redfish" by A. D. Livingston. With Dutch oven cooking becoming a part of the teardropper experience, I thought this would be an interesting reference from which I could write articles for the TOW Line.

We've all been intrigued about the origin of the name "Dutch" oven. The author sheds some clues about this. He states that the inventor of the original Dutch oven remains in question. He goes on to tell us that some writers speculate that Paul Revere designed it. But, he continues: "In all probability, the more or less final shape of this versatile piece of cookware came about in steps, evolving to suit the needs of the American settler and the westward expansion. Most modern authorities believe the name 'Dutch' to have come about because the cookware was sold by Dutch peddlers."

Another explanation attributed the name to Dutch O'Leary, a celebrated frontiersman. Maybe he was famous because of his skill with this type cookware. In addition, the author thinks that a trapper named Steeljaws Newhouse added the lid with an upturned rim for holding coals on top of the oven. In any case, the Dutch oven was an important piece of gear for frontier people.

So, whether Paul Revere, Dutch peddlers, O'Leary or Steeljaws were involved, we happily use this piece of cast iron cookware at most of our gatherings for us all to enjoy.

### **REGISTERING YOUR TEARDROP IN OREGON**

This has been a controversy for quite a while in Oregon. So, this editor decided to surf the web page of the Oregon DMV.

It appears that our teardrop trailer can be defined as a "travel trailer". Per the <u>Camper and Travel</u> <u>Trailer Information</u> page, section 2 tells us:

"A travel trailer is designated to provide facilities for human habitation (permanent sleeping and cooking facilities). A travel trailer is 8.5 feet wide or less that is **not** used for commercial or business purposes." It continues to describe the sizes of a travel trailer.

Thus, my conclusion is that you **do not** have to register our "Recreational vehicle" if you claim that you do not have a <u>permanent</u> cooking facility. My thinking is that a removable camp stove in a drawer is **not** permanent. If the stove is bolted down, it also would **not** be a permanent installation. A built-in stove would be permanent.

However, one of the DMV cautions states: "You may wish to title your trailer because most law enforcement agencies and insurance companies want to see proof of ownership if it is ever stolen." Fees are \$54.00 if it is 10 feet long. For 14 feet, you pay \$72.00. Every two years.

On our trip through Colorado, a trooper stopped us because of no license plate. When I approached him, I jokingly said, "Friends in Oregon told me you would stop me, but in Oregon we don't have to register a teardrop trailer". He let me go. However, you might want to have a copy of the page mentioned in this article in your trailer.

We rewired the trailer and repaired the taillights with new "beehive" style lenses. Bob has also has done some painting and polishing on the TD. Kitty Hammer, who led us through the short tour last February (during the Potluck gathering), was there to receive the TD. She was quite pleased on how it looked and stated that Mrs. LeMay was looking forward to seeing the finished trailer the next day.

Kitty also said they are getting a 1942 Chrysler ready for the feature car at this year's Open House and she would like to see, and will do what she can, to have the teardrop behind the Chrysler. That would be neat to see.

Bob and I have met a number of times this spring and have agreed that the LeMay teardrop project resulted in what everyone was hoping to achieve. Please join us for our third annual Majestic Mt. Baker Rally the weekend of **August 14<sup>th</sup> to the 17<sup>th</sup>**. The Deming Log-Show Grounds, near Bellingham, Washington is the location. The focus is all vintage trailers & motor homes 25 years and older. Because teardrop trailers are icons of the past, you all are welcome too. Come and see the trailers as seen in the book "Trailer Travel – A Visual History of Mobile America".

The rally site is quiet with grass and trees with numerous antique logging equipment displays to view. There are clean restrooms and a shower house available. Thirty power/water hookup sites (first come first served unless there is a medical need) and unlimited dry camping is available. There's a small playground for the children. Children and well-behaved pets are welcome. Owners are responsible for

cleaning up after their pets. There are water taps available for drawing water and there's a sewer dump station at the grounds.

A nice grocery store with gas is close by on the Mt. Baker Hwy. Area attractions include Mt. Baker, the Nooksack river, the Nooksack Tribal Casino, mountain biking trails at Lake Padden, the Dutch town of Lynden, an old time country store called "Everybody's Store" and lots of country roads to explore.

We plan on having a potluck dinner on at least one night. Another night will be a TCT (Tin Can Tourist) sponsored pizza feed. There will be vintage trailer video movies in the evenings and a nice campfire to visit around after dark. This will be our first year for a swap meet so please bring miscellaneous trailer related, household, etc items for this event. There will be a "trailer tech talk" program Saturday morning. A question and answer session will be included.

Parking is \$10.00 per night for water/power hookups and \$5.00 dry camping. The rally fee is \$10.00 for TCT members and \$15.00 for non-members per unit for the four-day event. Early arrivals are most welcome.
